






	Land tax continues to develop with similar themes which play out year on year, with taxpayers challenging outcomes through the Tribunals and Courts. Compounding the issues, the development of surcharge duty and surcharge land tax has resulted in higher acquisition and holding costs on taxpayers that are, or a deemed to be foreign persons. Language used in legislation, particularly deeming provisions, can be quite different from the ordinary meaning as understood by an unadvised taxpayer. It is often the case that these higher acquisition and holding costs can make the investment commercially unviable. 




