



Recent discussion in Alcoa [2025] ARTA 482 highlighted issues with expert reports, following similar concerns raised in Chevron. These matters have drawn attention to the need to scrutinise the instructions given to experts and the content of expert reports prepared for tax disputes. Expert evidence can make or break a case and expert opinions play a significant role across a wide range of tax issues, not just transfer pricing.

This session explores practical approaches for selecting, briefing and managing experts to ensure evidence is credible, persuasive and fit for purpose. It also provides insights into what enhances the value of an expert report and what commonly undermines it.

3:30 – 4:30pm	<p>Session 6: Determining Purpose for Different Tax Purposes Speakers: Shalini De Silva, KPMG, Sakshi Mathur, KPMG</p> <p>The concept of “purpose” is an important element across various aspects of Australian tax legislation. The practical application of purpose tests often involves uncertainty, particularly in determining the evidence relevant to establishing the required purpose. Most notably, the General Anti-Avoidance Rule in Part IVA contains an objective dominant purpose test requiring consideration of the factors listed in section 177D of the ITAA 1936. More recently, the legislature has preferred to adopt the concept of a “principal purpose” in the Multinational Anti-Avoidance Law, the Diverted Profits Tax and the Multilateral Instrument.</p> <p>In addition to considering the scope of these concepts and how they have evolved through relevant case law, this session considers other statutory tests and case law principles involving a purpose element, exploring themes, challenges and practical approaches. Examples include section 100A, other anti-avoidance rules, promoter penalties, the primary production exemption from land tax and luxury car tax.</p>

Michael's experience covers a wide range of federal tax topics, such as the anti-avoidance provisions (including Part IVA), international tax (including transfer pricing, transferor trusts, controlled foreign companies and treaty issues), indirect tax, and a range of other matters, such as issues concerning company distributions, dividends, share premium or capital accounts and trust taxation. Michael appeared as a member of the counsel team for the taxpayer in *Chevron Australia Holdings Pty Ltd v Commissioner of Taxation* [2017] FCAFC 62.

Shalini De Silva is a legal partner with over 15 years of experience assisting clients resolve their tax disputes with Revenue authorities. Her clients include corporate groups and multinationals, high net worth individuals and small businesses. Her experience covers all phases of tax disputes including

voluntary disclosures, reviews, audits, objections, alternative dispute resolution and litigation. She is currently a partner in the Tax Controversy and Dispute Resolution team at KPMG Law and prior to that she was part of the Tax Controversy and Dispute Resolution team at PricewaterhouseCoopers (PwC). She has worked on many complex tax matters involving both federal and state taxes across a diverse range of industries. She also spent two years working in London at HMRC, Clifford Chance and the Treasury Solicitor's Department (during a leave of absence from PwC).

Jeremy Geale, CTA, is a Partner at MinterEllison. Jeremy Geale joined MinterEllison recently, having previously been a Deputy Commissioner with the ATO responsible for the ATO's Review and Dispute Resolution area, covering all objections and litigation. He was also formerly the Deputy Chief Tax Counsel responsible for superannuation. Jeremy has more than 20 years tax and superannuation experience, most of which has been spent assisting taxpayers and the ATO to resolve complex tax disputes from audit through to litigation. He regularly acts for a number of funds, assisting them with engagement with

the ATO, management of tax risk and governance, audit assistance and dispute resolution.

Alper Gokoglu is a Senior Manager and lawyer at Ernst & Young Australia. With a strong background in transfer pricing, he now specialises in tax controversy matters. He has experience acting for clients across various industries in respect of a range of income tax issues, including transfer pricing, anti-avoidance provisions, TOFA and capital/revenue issues. He has been involved in a number of matters before the Federal Court of Australia and Administrative Review Tribunal (and its antecedent).

Clint Harding, CTA, is a partner at Arnold Bloch Leibler and leads the Sydney taxation practice. Clint advises across most taxes, with particular expertise in corporate and international tax, the taxation of financial instruments and transactions, and the management of tax audits and disputes with the ATO. Clint is the author of numerous tax articles, a regular presenter and former Chair of The Tax Institute's Large Business and International Committee. In 2018, Clint won The Tax Institute's Corporate Tax Adviser of the Year Award and was the recipient of the Tax Institute's Community Champion Award in 2023. He is the

Fiona Knight, CTA, is the Deputy Commissioner of Public Groups, Engagement, at the ATO with responsibility for ensuring large businesses and multinational taxpayers pay the right amount of tax with regards to their Australian obligations. Prior to that, Fiona worked in the Tax Counsel Network, including DCTC roles, providing advice on the most complex technical issues with a focus on international tax and anti-avoidance provisions. Fiona was a longstanding member and deputy chair of the ATO's General Anti-Avoidance Rules (GAAR) Panel.


